MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 22ND MEETING.

Don Wippert brought in his list of dealers and checked the ticket that was drawn against his list. The winner was Number 12 which is Don Keys. Don Wippert said that he will call the winner.

OLD BUSINESS:

Bob Manthorne brought in information he got from the Duarte Elk's Lodge. He gave the information to President Dave Maryo. Bob reported that he was asked how much we are currently paying for a rental fee. The representative from the lodge said that they could probably work with us. Bob also mentioned that the lodge has a ballroom for weddings and a room that will hold up to 75 people with tables in it. He also said that the Elk's hold their meetings the third Thursday of every month. Discussion was held concerning this fact. Dave Maryo will be checking with the lodge to see if something can be worked out for our club to hold our monthly meetings and annual shows at their facility. One last comment was made that we don't have much time left before the end of the year, so we have to move quickly on this.

NEW BUSINESS:

Dave Maryo said he will call the badge-making people in Oregon who have been making our club badges and see what has to be done. There are six badges that need to be ordered.

This year the Leadville Show got incorporated into a "larger than life" driving trip for Dar and I. First we stopped in Ouray as planned and spent a few days taking care of some donations a cousin had entrusted me with to drop off at the museum while in Ouray. Of course we spent quality time with a friend of ours who runs a book store in the historic Beaumont Hotel. We had to make at least one more driving trip up a narrow mountain trail to the famous Camp Bird Mine that was once a hot spot for gold and silver mining. Dar and I have made this trip before. This time we followed our trusty book store owner who is also a rock hound guy. He has appeared in the Rocks and Minerals Magazine from time to time. While I wasn't feeling up to anything strenuous, Dar said I did okay and she took pictures to back up my words. Fumbling and stumbling around over a hillside and on the surface we were able to pick up a few nice pieces while our rock hound friend, Bob Stoufer, was after the "real good stuff" he could cut and polish and sell in his book store. LAHBC Club Member's Visit to the Robert Frank Museum

In March of 2011 a group of LAHBC club members took a trip to Lompoc California to visit the Robert Frank Museum. Members arrived one by one and started a tour of this very unusual museum. The museum curator Brian Shull greeted everyone while Robert was out at a sale looking for more unusual items to add to the museum collection. The museum tour was self guided, but Brian was always on hand to answer questions. The lit wall of bottles was the attention grabber as we walked through the entrance. Rare bitters and whiskeys lined the shelves with the wonderful colors sparkling like jewels. Although the rare bottles could support a museum on their own, there were many other interesting items to be found in the museum. As we walked around the museum our club members slowly moved on from the draw of antique bottles to find Native American baskets, pottery, dolls, and some very unusual arrow heads. I had never seen arrow heads like these in brilliant colors and such pristine condition. I just had to find out more about these fantastic stone tools and asked Brian about them. Wow, was I surprised when he told me they were not old and he had made them by chipping the flint and glass to produce perfectly shaped arrow heads and stone tools. He went on to talk about learning how to produce the stone tools from his father and Native American tribal leaders. The chipped stone items he produced are not just reproductions of early stone tools, they are works of art. Moving on the next item to catch my eye was a huge round fossilized shell. The shell was as large as a small dining room table and had a glistening opalescent surface that sparkled like a piece of carnival glass. Next to the shell was a group of crystals larger than any specimen I have ever seen. By now I had almost forgotten about the bottles that drew me to visit the museum in the first place. Just beyond the fossilized shell there were groups of fossils hanging from the wall that looked like stone pictures. The flat stones had the fossilized remains of fish, birds and other animals. While I was distracted by this ancient art I heard a commotion and turned around to see club members gathering around Robert as he returned from his buying excursion. Everyone was gathering around Robert to hear him talk about some of the items in the

museum. Of course our group was interested in bottles so he focused his attention on some of the items he had found interesting. One group of bottles were not as old as most of the examples in the museum, but they were the highlight of his collecting experience that he shared with us. All of these bottles had a curious design of painted beads around the inside of each bottle. Bottles filled with these beads had a tag indicating the length of the string of beads. If you added up the lengths I am sure it would be miles of beads filling these interesting art bottles. Robert went on to explain how he had come to acquire this unique set of bottles. Many years ago when Robert was a member of the Santa Barbara bottle club he met a man that bought large bottles in unusual shapes to fill with beads. He told us that Mr. Bean was a member of the club, but he did not have the same antique bottle collecting passion as most of the others in the club. Instead Mr. Bean would buy the newer bottles that the other collectors did not want and filled them with strings of beads. Robert would often find Mr. Bean at flea markets buying old beaded bags and purses only to remove the beads so he could paint each individual bead. Mr. Bean would also use the strings from the bags and purses by tying the short lengths together for his artistic bottle hobby. The artistic touch to Mr. Bean's bottles was the way he placed the stringed beads into the bottles by carefully using a stick to guide the strings of beads and filling the inside with uniform layers of spiraled beads. Many years after Robert had last seen Mr. Bean he found these bottles filled with beads at an estate sale. Robert knew these bottles were Mr. Bean's creations. He had tried to buy some of these works of art from Mr. Bean years ago, but they were not for sale. Now finding these works of art at an estate sale he purchase them all to place in his museum with the other wonders to be seen by visitors. If you ever have the chance to visit the Robert Frank Museum you will not be disappointed even if you are not a bottle collector.
